As our administrative world gets more complex, our expenses have increased to where we have been losing money the last two years. Our current dues structure has been in place for as long as any of us can remember. The increase in dues will allow us to update our website, provide liability insurance, and fairly compensate our treasurer who has borne the brunt of these changes. Our dues are still low compared with similar organizations and they will allow us to keep up with 21st century organizational demands.

30-Day Notice to all SACA Members regarding change in By-Laws

At the annual meeting, the subject of what makes up a Family membership with SACA was brought up as part of the discussion to raise the dues to \$30 for an individual membership and \$45 for a family membership. As a result of this discussion, the board is suggesting that the family membership be limited to two people. This will keep studios with many members from signing up as one whole unit under family membership, instead as individual artists.

Here is the suggested change:

Currently the bylaws on this subject read, under ARTICLE III, Number 2: Family memberships may be held by two or more individuals in the same family sharing studio facilities. A Family membership is entitled to one copy of SACA publications per membership; otherwise each Family member receives the same benefits as Individual members.

The suggested change is to take out the words "or more" shown in red above.

The next opportunity for SACA members to vote on this change will most likely be at the December 9 Holiday Party.

Screen Printing on Clay or How to make your own Screen so you can Print on Clay

Sunday, October 14, 2018 10am to 4pm

You may have seen the silkscreens. We will make our own! Come to Ramada 3 at Rillito Park and play with different screens on clay and after you play for a while you will make your own.

Have you ever wanted to write a word on a clay piece but your handwriting was not up to par. Using stencils and lining up the letters was a bother. Drawing the same picture time after time was a bother and gave you a different picture each time.

Now you can use your computer to print whatever you want. A simple line drawing in black and white or text can be duplicated exactly time after time. All you need to add is sunshine, an inexpensive screen, some underglaze and a leather hard or even dry piece of clay. You can even print on a rounded item or print around an edge.

Focus on the Future

Thank you to all the members who attended the Annual Meeting September 9 and voted for the 2019 Board of Directors. Along with all the activities planned for the rest of this year, we are



looking forward to pursuing more ideas soon for next year's programs.

During my term as SACA President in 2010-2011, focus groups became a popular way to bring attention to one issue at a time in a single meeting. Focus groups concentrate on positive ways to examine where we are and where we want to go, looking at many aspects of our organization and its activities. The idea is not to air complaints, but to identify root causes of any perceived problems, suggest ways to increase or improve programming, and search for creative solutions. Attendees should come prepared with ideas and resources, and brainstorming creates lots of other targets to pursue as well.

Usually consisting of some board members past and present, general members and occasionally non-members, focus groups have brought together interested people with knowledge and experience about the issue under discussion. They celebrated successes, identified problems, examined potential solutions, and provided great clarity about how to proceed in the future. However knotty the issues, the meetings always culminated in a positive direction about the road ahead. The focus groups also generated understanding and respect for many sides of an issue, and often forged new bonds among attendees.

At the end of September we are starting focus groups aimed at 2019 programming with two significant program areas:

SHOWS



WEBSITE REDO! WE WANT TO HEAR FROM YOU!

At the August 8 SACA Board Meeting, President Craig Wunderlich and the board formed a committee to investigate website upgrades and make recommendations back to the board. The Website Committee consists of Karen Phillips and LaVonne McCord, plus our tech stars Mary Swallow, Joanne Fisher, Theresa Poalucci, and Gabrielle Koza from Tempe. We have held a couple of web-based meetings, and have identified top priority tasks already underway in Phase 1. We are communicating ideas and feedback using some group sharing tools.

A website can often be the first face of an organization that people see. When a member or anyone inquires online about clay groups, it's reasonable to want our site to be attractive, function well, be up to date, and present a complete list of appealing programs. Redo Phase 1 priorities include online membership applications and payments, as well as applications and payments for shows, workshops and jurying. Phase 1 also includes a complete calendar of SACA events from community service events to socials, board meetings, plus many more member-oriented benefits.

DO YOU HAVE A WEBSITE IDEA?

What we might be missing is YOUR idea for an amazing function to include in the Website Redo. The committee will analyze every new idea we receive, and slot it into the most appropriate Phase. Your idea might already be underway in Phase 1, or it might fit nicely into Phase 2 plans. Or, I have to warn you, it may not fit at all. One of my own gleefully submitted ideas received a very kindly worded rejection saying a system to do *that* would have to be 'way more robust and more costly than SACA needs. While our tech stars can and should analyze ideas from many sides, that shouldn't stop us from dreaming big. Toss in your most wishful idea — because even if it ends up in Phase 273 (as in never), it might spark another idea or version that fits well into the plan.

CAN YOU VOLUNTEER?

Also, we have some specific requests for website volunteers. A website requires constant attention to keep the calendar up to date, along with meeting information, activities and socials. If you are interested in being a Website Editor, please let us know. It is our intent to build a user-friendly site that will allow Website Editors to be well trained in certain functions.

Needed, too, are members who can act as User Testers for the new site. As we develop and implement functions on our test site, it will be helpful for User Testers to try out the functions, see what may and may not be working as planned, and give specific feedback to our committee.



Festival Booth Opportunity Non-Juried

As funding for art and music programs continue to decline across the state, children have limited access to explore creativity of the arts. Arizona Zipline Adventures invites all businesses and supporters to join the campaign to provide children in the Tri-Community with such programs that extend beyond the classroom.FAM Fest is presented by Arizona Zipline Adventures (AZA)to raise money in support of music and art workshops at the Oracle Community Center. The fall festival will be held on October 13, 2018 and will feature local and regional musicians, artists and food vendors. Artists, musicians and food vendors will be located all along the trail system on AZA property and guests will experience art and culture in a unique, natural setting.
