

# Let's Boost the Bylaws

Some people think Bylaws are relegated to a dusty ole document moldering away in a lost file cabinet. Your hardworking Board members, however, consider our Bylaws to be a living declaration of our best intentions as an organization. Over several months, Board discussions have touched on our job descriptions so they may be updated and posted for all to see. The bulk of changes you see below come from an analysis of the jobs we currently see as necessary to best conduct our business.

Bylaws may be amended at any general member meeting with an affirmative vote by a majority of members present. The Board has several recommendations for members to consider. This year at the September 15 Annual Meeting, the proposed amendments will be put to vote.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP – Under Membership we have added language about "return Members (those who have not paid dues for two or more years.)" At the annual meeting on September 18, 2017, members voted to define a new member as one who never joined SACA or who lapsed for two or more years. That was done to confer an extra year upon those joining or returning in September. This current Bylaws change defines those who have lapsed for two more years as "returning" members, not another version of "new" members.

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES – All committee Coordinator titles have been changed to **Chair** for clarity and simplicity in writing and speaking. The other changes in this section reflect the current direction and intention of SACA.

- The title of Public Relations Coordinator has been struck out in favor of "Marketing Chair," a job description that better describes the nature and needs of our organization.
- The Webmaster job was removed from the board in perhaps 2015. The current board sees a need for strong interaction and direction with the Website Manager. Also, modern technology places high demands on the organization for maintaining digital and technical licensing and agreements, which require a high level of attention by a knowledgeable manager. This position is restored to the board, with the title of Website and Technology Manager.
- Socials Coordinator is changed to Member Programs Chair. Socials usually represent a welcome facet of member programs, but the emphasis is on clay related topics across a wide range of formats and events.

Detailed committee chair job descriptions will soon be posted in Job Descriptions on the SACA website under the Board of Directors page.

ARTICLE IX DISSOLUTION – This entire article was apparently inadvertently missed in retyping an unrelated Bylaws update sometime after 2009. It is a single sentence outlining board responsibilities in case of dissolution and should be restored.

The complete wording for the <u>Proposed Amendments</u> is displayed on the website, where you can also see the Bylaws as they now exist.

# WORKSHOPS

Digital Marketing Techniques Making Social Media Work For You When the Instagram flowchart first went up on the screen, it seemed totally undecipherable. But as Andrew Vigil-Emerson began his explanations, things began to fall into place for the Modern Marketing workshop attendees on Sunday, July 14. Andrew's four-hour presentation covered a lot of ground regarding how and why artists should use Instagram to promote their art and expand their reach in this digital age. He had thoughtful guestions for us about what we want to accomplish and the audience we want to influence, sharing his insightful and very knowledgeable answers about how an artist may be more successful on this platform. He showed how easy it is to post photos and videos, explaining how to recognize good, interesting content to share. The 20-some attendees included many ceramic artists, naturally, but also welcomed artists in watercolors, jewelry and other art forms. The level of knowledge in the group ranged from abject ignorance to a better-than-average use of Instagram -- certainly a challenge for the presenter. Andrew had many tips for setting oneself up for success, such as creating your account as a business account to reap the many metrics it provides as feedback. The individual artists learned many insights about using Instagram, but also the SACA board members who attended understood how our organization can best position itself on the platform. If you are an Instagram user, you might expect to find SACA popping up in your notifications sometime in the near future. We expect to get aboard this modern train soon to help spread the word about SACA, its programs and its artists.

When used, glass should not exceed 36 united inches (H +W). Any larger pieces must use artist quality acrylic glazing, if needed. Framing is required on canvases that are less than 1  $\frac{1}{2}$ " deep. Mixed media that is three dimensional but can hang on the wall is allowed.

Entry fee: \$26 for one entry; \$37 for two entries

- All media must be wired and ready to hang (no plastic frames or sawtooth hangers)
- Work should be recent within the past five years
- All work must be for sale. A 25% commission is retained by the gallery on any sales
