

A Message from the President

METRICS ARE MEANINGFUL MEASUREMENTS

Metrics may sound at first like a pretty dull topic, but it's full of very interesting measurements that help interpret "how are we doing?"

For example, we held eight Member Programs during the first seven months of 2019 and will reach twelve by the end of this year. Member Programs are always free and open to the public and are the backbone of SACA's varied presentations which address our wide audience of member interests. This year they included studio tours, field trips, international art, a member art critique, a materials swap, artist lectures and videos, plus SACA's annual meeting and party, both potlucks.

Shows are another type of event popular with our membership. During 2019 we will complete two major Shows and a non-juried exhibition at the Main Library. Next year may well present some additional show opportunities with new venues currently under consideration.

A brand-new type of program, Clay Café, has become very popular in 2019, and nine events are on offer this inaugural year. Clay Café began with a mug meet in January, and since then topics have ranged widely to a clay play day, teapots, carving, boxes, handles, lids, totems and maybe raku. Clay Cafés are a low cost, very intimate discussion group hosted in a member's home or studio.

Workshops will meet a goal of six for this year. We strive for a good mix of

Our Workshops Chairs have been assisted by energetic volunteers to create a wide variety of educational offerings. Workshop topics and presenters are typically known to draw in new members who want to be a part of our organization.

New members are so very important to the ongoing health and vitality of SACA. Some metrics you may or may not know: Membership on 3/31/18 was 152 -- a very disconcerting low that Board Members have been using as a benchmark in our membership growth efforts. By the end of last month, July 2019, membership totaled 209, a massive 38% increase. That includes a very welcome total so far of 23 newcomers.

We appreciate that new members bring their own unique package of interests and experience, but they are doubly important because they fill the empty seats left by attrition. Attrition is a fact of life in every organization, and it reaffirms that our search for new members must be ongoing all year.

As you can see from the numbers of Member Programs, Clay Cafés, Workshops and Shows so far this year, SACA offers many interesting events to members and nonmembers. Please pass along this good news to your classmates, students, work colleagues and friends. Invite them to share in these excellent programs.

These metrics show that we have a lot to celebrate this year. We owe thanks to all the event planners and to those many attendees who have supported these programs. You all demonstrate a renewed level of energy and commitment to maintaining the SACA we have loved for decades.

Boxes ARE the Best

Perhaps boxes are so popular because they encompass so many shapes, sizes, colors, and uses, among their many other attributes. The Clay Café about boxes on July 20 showed off a myriad of alternative boxes and engendered a lot of discussion about all their attributes, including lids, textures and feet vs no-feet.

Karen Phillips demonstrated how she creates lids for irregular boxes by building them upside down. Each attendee brought one or more examples of boxes and discussed what they liked, or not. Lynne Gingerich brought her box finished very like leather that she'd made in a workshop by Marilyn Levine, famous for her realistic leather-look sculptures. Like several others, Linza Bethea brought a box she had made and freely discussed the pros and cons of her methods.

Hosted by Elaine Dow in her mid-town studio, the group was enthusiastic and closely examined each box as it went around the circle. The variety was amazing and set a great example of why boxes are so widely admired.



HANDLES, FEET & LUGS

Why feet? Or handles? And what are lugs anyway? Come to the September 5th Clay Café and discuss these workhorses used on many kinds of vessels and other ceramic forms. Handles range from lovely to utilitarian, while feet might merely provide a lift or a lot of personality. And lugs can do many services for vessels of all sizes. When used, glass should not exceed 36 united inches (H +W). Any larger pieces must use artist quality acrylic glazing, if needed. Framing is required on canvases that are less than 1 ½" deep. Mixed media that is three dimensional but can hang on the wall is allowed.

Entry fee: \$26 for one entry; \$37 for two entries Jpg images sized at 300 dpi, 1800 pix on the longest side and named with first four letters of the artist's last name, the number of the entry, and a short version of the title (smit1summerlight.jpg) should be emailed to: Nancy Huber- images@southernazwatercolorguild.com.

Details:

- All media must be wired and ready to hang (no plastic frames or sawtooth hangers)
- Work should be recent within the past five years
- All work must be for sale. A 25% commission is retained by the gallery on any sales
