Kazuma Sambe, local ceramic artist, will present a talk and show slides of his work at our member meeting on Saturday, February 8, 7:00 PM in the Ward 6 Council Office at 3202 E. First Street.


Kazuma was born in New York but spent most of his youth in Japan where he was educated. He moved to Tucson to study biochemistry and discovered ceramics – a moment that changed the direction of his life. He studied under Hiro Tashima at Pima, then moved on to the University of Arizona for a BFA and then to ASU where he received his MFA. Luckily for us, he moved back to Tucson where he now teaches ceramics at Pima Community College.

Kazuma shows his work in several galleries and was featured in *Ceramics Monthly* as an emerging artist.

Many of his works feature food, or their containers, but from an angle never before imagined. Often his creatures -- fish, dragons, chickens -- have features that invite scrutiny because they are so highly detailed.

WE CAN GIVE THEM "FEATS OF CLAY"

Most may see clay as a humble material, a base material, little better than dirt. But the hands of an artist can refine it into forms that serve us, inspire and amuse us. An experienced artist knows its magic. But young hands can feel that same magic, and learn to knead a knot of clay into a work of infant art. Our Community Outreach programs put clay into young hands to mold, shape, play, learn, and hopefully feel the draw of a clay connection for the rest of their lives. We literally give them "feats of clay."

You recognize that as a play on "feet of clay," of course. Apparently, the Old Testament started it, and the idea has persisted through the ages – we express disappointment in our heroes when their faults show up by saying they have "feet of clay." This common, humble, dirty material is considered unsuitable, a comedown for our idols' sculptures of bronze and more precious metals.

The real disappointment is that clay is seen as unworthy. But didn't it all start with clay? Isn't clay the perfect medium to put into young hands? Doesn't its tactile nature speak to young and old alike? Art teachers across Southern Arizona agree, and use clay projects in their classrooms to teach many important skills to their kids.

As you know, we started a program of Art Teacher Grants in late 2019, and will continue it into 2020. The teachers who applied for these grants expressed gratitude and great enthusiasm for the clay projects they could do with SACA awards. They know clay work will enrich their students, especially those new to clay. SACA is helping young hands and minds create "feats" of clay with this program, and we are proud to do so.

We can definitely impact the lives of young people learning to use this humble, common, miraculous, surprising, wonderful, moldable, accessible material which, as we well know, might captivate them for years.
