# Journey to Japan

#### Part 1

This past August, I was incredibly fortunate to travel to Japan on the iCAN Journey to Japan ceramics tour of Kyoto and Tokyo! I knew getting to Osaka was going to be a very long trip, so I planned my arrival for a day early in case of any delays enroute and to give myself time to recoup a bit. Fortunately, I didn't encounter any delays, however, transferring from the international terminal to the domestic was a bit tricky. I'm happy to say it all worked out in the end.

Day one in Osaka was a leisurely day on my own followed by a meet and greet that evening in the hotel lobby with the rest of the group. Since I didn't know anyone, this was a great icebreaker and I discovered that folks from US, Canada and Israel signed up for the trip. There were 21 of us, plus our fantastic tour guides, Matt and Keiko, two amazing people that I'm so happy I got to meet.

Early the next morning we hopped on our tour bus to Zuiho-in and explored the Daitoku-Ji Zen monastery and gardens, which were gorgeous. We attended a tea ceremony introduction by a Zen monk who is also a master of The Way of Tea and had a great discussion about tea bowls and the 400-year-old history of the Tea Ceremony. We were all served our tea in different styles of tea bowls, and then passed them around while the tea master told us about each one. Virtually all of them had been gifted to the monastery by local potters. Aren't potters generous people? I think so. We continued to tour the gardens, temples and the bonsai exhibit including a

600 year old tree, then had a wonderful vegetarian lunch of never-ending tastes and textures.

That afternoon we visited the gallery of art historian, author and lecturer, Robert Yellin. Yellin gave us a brief history of Japanese ceramics then talked about the artists he represents, and the incredible work offered in his gallery. His knowledge of Japanese ceramics is mind-blowing. I had heard of Robert before but getting to know him for a few days was amazing. Read more about him and the gallery. We then went to Ginkaku-ji to see the Temple of the Silver Pavilion and the Philosopher's Path, which were breathtaking.

Day 2 started with Robert leading us on an excursion to the Tamba region in the Hyogo prefecture. We visited the Old Tamba Pottery Museum followed by visits to several potters including Nishihata Tadashi, considered one of the greatest living Tamba potters, and Ichino Masahiko, a 2nd generation potter knows for his innovative forms. There are 50 or more kilns in the area (studios are called kilns in Japan) and Tamba ware has been made in the area for over 700 years. This was followed by one of the best dinners I've ever had at Hyouto Shijo Karasuma, a shabu-shabu (hot pot) style restaurant. The food was impeccable and we had so much fun. There was a lot of saki and beer flowing that night!

Day 3 was a tour of Kyoto's Gion district which felt like stepping back in time. The area is as it was 150 years ago. It is home to the maiko, geiko (geisha) in training, and one of the five geisha districts in Kyoto. We then visited the Kenninji Zen Monastery, which was founded in the 1200s and most of the temples date back to the 1600s. We were then free to explore Kyoto on our own for the rest of the day and it's beautiful. Day 4 started with a visit to the home of a 5th generation gold leaf master, Noguchi Yasushi. I'll admit, I wasn't too sure this would interest me, but it was fantastic! He applies gold, silver, or platinum leaf to washi paper in incredible colors and patterns. The paper is then woven with silk and becomes the stunningly beautiful kimono obi. His humor and pure joy for his craft was delightful. We also met his wife and his son, soon to be the 6th generation master. The Kitano Tenmangu shrine followed by the Kiyomizu district for an introduction to Kyoto's formal functional ware and tea ware was next, followed by a tour of the many shops and galleries. And boy did we shop! It was a good thing that I traveled carry-on only, or I would have been in big trouble. I purchased the most amazing little rabbit sculpture by celebrated artist Masaru Nishikawa, and the gallery boxed him up in a little crate so I could get him safely and soundly to his new home in Tucson.

Japan is so amazing, it's hard to describe. The Japanese people are incredible, I really didn't experience a language barrier at all, the land is stunning, it's incredibly clean and I felt safe everywhere I went, didn't matter if I was with the group our out on my own.
